On June 28th 1969, New York City's Stonewall Inn encountered a routine police raid. After raid upon raid, the bar's patrons – a diverse set of gay, lesbian, and trans people eventually met these raids with resistance. Fighting back against police oppression, their actions have been seen by many as the start of the Queer Liberation Movement.

What many don't know is that their resistance is a result of agitation and organizing many years before. In 1966 and 1959, queer patrons in San Francisco's Compton's Cafeteria and Coopers' Donuts attacked police after years of harassment and the arrests of several drag queens and sex workers.

From the very beginning, being queer was a threat to the status quo.
